Basic Rules



Neutral point of view – All Wikipedia articles and other encyclopedic content must be written from **a neutral point of view**, representing significant views fairly, proportionately and without bias.



Verifiability – Material challenged or likely to be challenged, and all quotations, must be attributed to a reliable, published source. In Wikipedia, verifiability means that people reading and editing the encyclopedia can check that information comes from a reliable source.



No original research – Wikipedia does not publish original thought: all material in Wikipedia must be attributable to a reliable, published source. Articles may not contain any new analysis or synthesis of published material that serves to advance a position not clearly advanced by the sources.

Basic Rules : Notability



On Wikipedia, **notability** is a test used by editors to decide whether a given topic warrants its own article. Information on Wikipedia must be [verifiable](#); if no reliable [third-party](#) sources can be found on a topic, then it should not have a separate article. Wikipedia's concept of notability applies this basic standard to avoid [indiscriminate inclusion](#) of topics. Article and list topics must be notable, or "worthy of notice". Determining notability does not *necessarily* depend on things such as fame, importance, or popularity—although those may enhance the acceptability of a subject that meets the guidelines explained below.

A topic is [presumed](#) to merit an article if:

1. It meets either the general notability guideline below or the criteria outlined in a subject-specific guideline listed in the box on the right.
2. It is not excluded under the [What Wikipedia is not](#) policy.

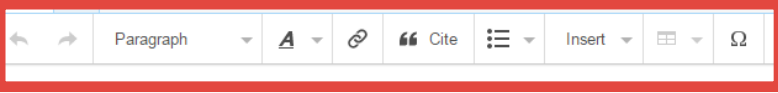

Biography

Early life

Hooks was born in Hopkinsville, Kentucky to a working-class family. Her father, Veodis Watkins, was a custodian and her mother, Rosa Bell Watkins, a homemaker. She had five sisters and one brother. "An avid reader, she was educated in racially segregated public schools, and wrote of great adversities when making the transition to an integrated school, where teachers and students were predominantly white.

She graduated from Hopkinsville High School in Hopkinsville, Kentucky. She obtained her B.A. in English from Stanford University in 1973, and her M.A. in English from the University of Wisconsin–Madison in 1976. In 1983, after several years of teaching and writing, she completed her doctorate in literature at the University of California, Santa Cruz, with a dissertation on author Toni Morrison.

Career

Hooks's teaching career began in 1976 as an English professor and senior lecturer in Ethnic Studies at the University of Southern California. During her three years there, Golemics (a Los Angeles publisher) released her first published work, a chapbook of poems titled "And There We Wept" (1978), written under her pen name, "bell hooks". She adopted her grandmother's name as a pen name because her grandmother "was known for her snappy and bold tongue, which [she] greatly admired". She put the name in lowercase letters "to distinguish [herself] from [her grandmother]". She said that her unconventional lowercasing of her name signifies

How drafts work [edit source]

Finding drafts [edit source]

Drafts are *not indexed* by most search engines including Google,^[1] meaning most readers will not find them. Anyone may search and view drafts on Wikipedia directly using Wikipedia's built-in search engine: simply choose "Advanced", then tick "Draft" or "Draft talk" on the list of options [1]¶. The list of all Draft pages is at *Special:AllPages* or *Special:PrefixIndex*. You may also view *recent Draft changes* to the namespace, *newly created drafts* or visit a *random draft*.

Creating and editing drafts [edit source]

Anyone, including users who are not logged in, may create and edit drafts. Drafts in the namespace have "Draft:" before their normal title, and also have an associated draft talk page. Users who have *VisualEditor* enabled will be able to use *VisualEditor* just like on articles. Registered editors may also move a *userspace draft* in to the Draft namespace if they choose.

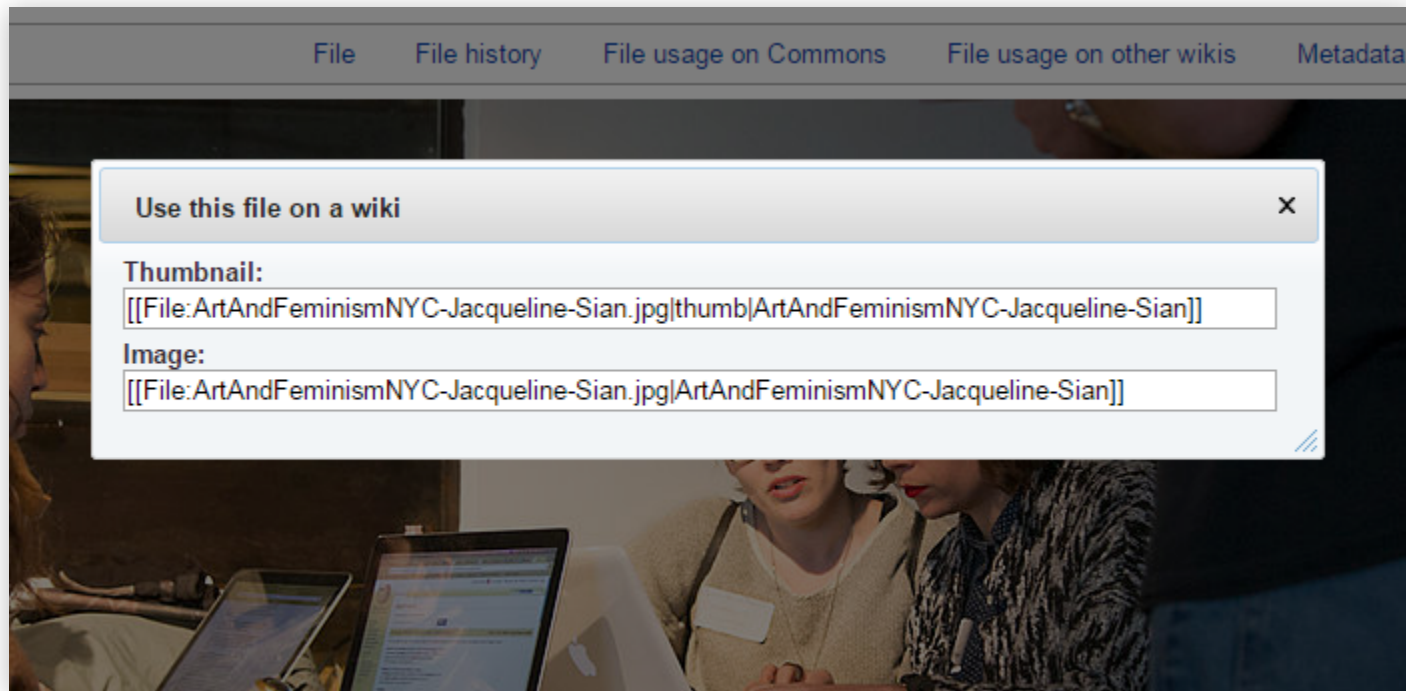

Global parameters `|width=` and `|height=` control the size of all images in the gallery unless overridden by an image's `|widthn=` parameter. The number of images per row is based upon the image width parameters and the width of the screen. The number of images per row can change when the user resizes the window.
