Basic Rules

Basic Rules: Core Content Policies



Neutral point of view – All Wikipedia articles and other encyclopedic content must be written from a neutral point of view, representing significant views fairly, proportionately and without bias.

Basic Rules: Core Content Policies



Verifiability – Material challenged or <u>likely to be challenged</u>, and all quotations, must be attributed to a reliable, published source. In Wikipedia, verifiability means that people reading and editing the encyclopedia can check that information comes from a <u>reliable source</u>.

Basic Rules: Core Content Policies



No original research – Wikipedia does <u>not</u> publish original thought: all material in Wikipedia must be attributable to a <u>reliable, published source</u>. Articles may not contain any new analysis or synthesis of published material that serves to advance a position not clearly advanced by the sources.

Basic Rules: Reliable Source



If available, academic and peer-reviewed publications are usually the most reliable sources.

Other reliable sources include:

- university-level textbooks
- books published by respected publishing houses
- magazines
- journals
- mainstream newspapers

Basic Rules: Notability



On Wikipedia, **notability** is a test used by editors to decide whether a given topic warrants its own article. Information on Wikipedia must be verifiable; if no reliable third-party sources can be found on a topic, then it should not have a separate article. Wikipedia's concept of notability applies this basic standard to avoid indiscriminate inclusion of topics. Article and list topics must be notable, or "worthy of notice". Determining notability does not *necessarily* depend on things such as fame, importance, or popularity—although those may enhance the acceptability of a subject that meets the guidelines explained below.

A topic is presumed to merit an article if:

- It meets either the general notability guideline below or the criteria outlined in a subject-specific guideline listed in the box on the right.
- 2. It is not excluded under the What Wikipedia is not policy.

What if notability guidelines reproduce structural sexism and racism? How can we address and amend this?

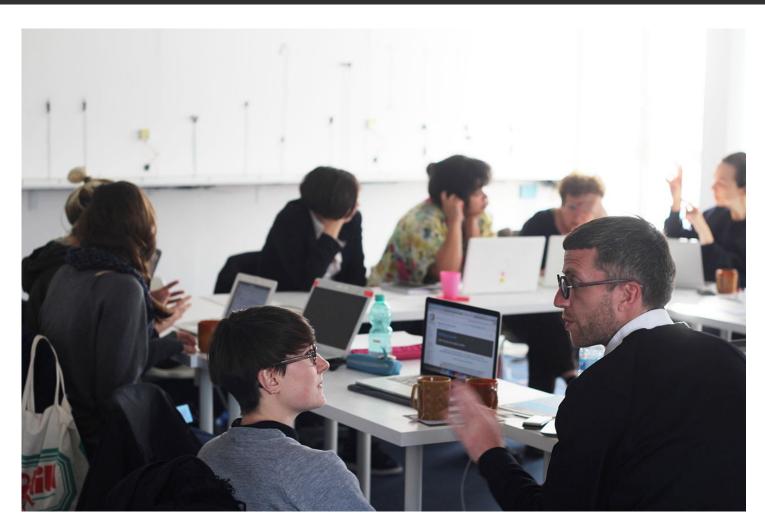

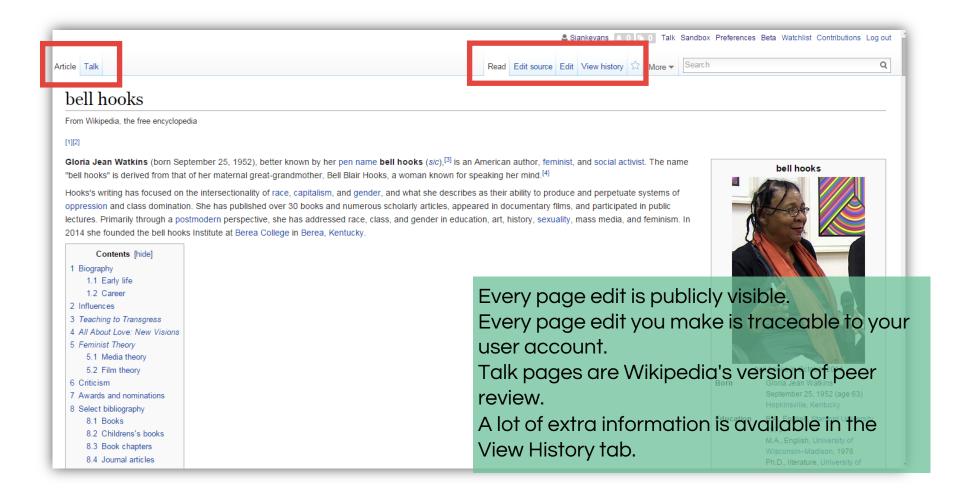



Gloria Jean Watkins (born September 25, 1952), better known by her pen name bell hooks (sic), [3] is an American author, feminist, and social activist. The name "bell hooks" is derived from that of her maternal great-grandmother, Bell Blair Hooks, a woman known for speaking her mind. [4]

Hooks's writing has focused on the intersectionality of race, capitalism, and gender, and what she describes as their ability to produce and perpetuate systems of oppression and class domination. She has published over 30 books and numerous scholarly articles, appeared in documentary films, and participated in public lectures. Primarily through a postmodern perspective, she has addressed race, class, and gender in education, art, history, sexuality, mass media, and feminism. In 2014 she founded the bell hooks Institute at Berea College in Berea, Kentucky.

Biography

Early life

Hooks was born in <u>Hopkinsville</u>. Kentucky to a working-class family. Her father, <u>Veodis</u> Watkins, was a custodian and her mother, Rosa Bell Watkins, a homemaker. She had five sisters and one brother. An avid reader, she was educated in racially segregated public schools, and wrote of great adversities when making the transition to an integrated school, where teachers and students were predominantly white.

She graduated from <u>Hopkinsville</u> High School in <u>Hopkinsville</u>, Kentucky. She obtained her B.A. in English from Stanford University in 1973, and her M.A. in English from the University of Wisconsin–Madison in 1976. In 1983, after several years of teaching and writing, she completed her doctorate in literature at the University of California Santa Cruz with a dissertation on author Toni Morrison.

Career

Hooks's teaching career began in 1976 as an English professor and senior lecturer in Ethnic Studies at the University of Southern California. During her three years there, <u>Golemics</u> (a Los Angeles publisher) released her first published work, a chapbook of poems titled "And There We Wept" (1978), written under her pen name, "bell hooks". She adopted her grandmother's name as a pen name because her grandmother "was known for her snappy and bold tongue, which [she] greatly admired." She put the page is loweressed letters. 
